Bowling Green Restoration



Restoration of Auchenblae's bowling green is now well underway thanks to investment by the Parks Committee, our local charitable body which oversees the maintenance of the village's recreation amenities of the Golf Club, Bowling Green and Den etc.

Every bowling green needs regular maintenance of its playing surface scheduled to the annual cycle of seasons. But every few years, invariably, a bowling green will need a significant "re-furb" as the diverse seed and roots of nature and our changeable seasonal patterns inevitably favour spurts of species pushing up into even the most manicured greens! Auchenblae's green was created well over 100 years ago and in recent years it has not had any major refurb. Gradually the surface has been changing and deteriorating in reaction to the changing environment, for example sapling growth etc. at the Den and other factors. More particularly, while Covid virus impacted us all last year, an invasion of Lichen did its own devastating damage to Auchenblae's bowling green and needed to be totally removed.

The restoration work has involved treatment for removing the lichen and moss and weeds, then scarifying to remove the dead matter, then brushing, re-seeding and top dressing and now the village awaits healthy regrowth until the bowling green surface will be established strongly enough for the return of the bowls and players' feet! Just when this can happen depends on nature and weather. Hopefully it can happen later this summer. The bowling season normally ends in mid to late September.

Meanwhile members of the Bowling Club look forward hopefully to a happy day of returning to the green. The Club will update the village as soon as this is possible with an invitation to come try bowling. The Club aims to attract new members of all ages - whether you are on
