It's been a while since we've featured in the Messenger although we hope to make a regular appearance from now on...

Our village hall remains well used and well loved if a little chilly over winter months – we have plans to improve that, read on! We are still home to Auchenblae Pre-School Group (APSG) who run Auchenblae toddlers group in the main hall on Friday mornings, Two's group upstairs in the mutual hall weekdays from 9am to 1pm and Pre-School weekdays from 9am to 3pm. This wonderful group also uses the old curling rink for outdoor education for 2 – 5 years olds. This is an amazing facility to have in our village and it's not an overstatement to say Auchenblae Pre-School Group is vital for the younger members of our community and in keeping our hall functioning.

We are also home to our warm and welcoming Auchenblae Community Café, open to all on Mondays from 10am to Noon. The hall is also utilised by Scouts, Cubs and Beavers, Auchenblae Tennis Club and Nemesis Kick Boxing. The hall plays host to many community events with eyes down for Bingo on the last Thursday of the month as well as regular fundraisers and private events. Our cinema club is planning to deliver more film nights and our committee is looking for party planners to help with the fun stuff, fundraisers and community nights out. Please get in touch if you can spare some time, for more info or if you are interested in hiring the hall for your group or special event.

We're pleased to have reopened Auchenblae Community Fund following our review and have received 16 applications with several from groups who have not previously benefited from the fund. Sadly, we only had 3 people apply to sit on the panel rather than the 7 initially required. In the absence of enough willing volunteers, our committee and the 3 volunteers have agreed to operate as a group of 5 including Kate Matthews and Sandy Noble. The fund total stands at £75,815.86 and we will assess applications over the coming weeks. We will present a full funding report at our AGM in February although information will likely be available prior to that.

The hall gets chilly.... is a bit of an understatement. Let's be blunt, it's Baltic and costs a small fortune to keep warm. Our committee are at the preliminary stages of an ambitious project to improve the energy efficiency of the hall as well as making it a warm and welcoming venue for all our community needs. Our goal is an ambitious renovation which will ensure the future of the hall for the next 100 years. We have applied for funding for a feasibility study and design and planning costs and look forward to engaging with the wider community about how we can improve the hall to serve your needs.

Our committee meets on the first Tuesday of the month at 7.30pm at the hall. All are welcome to attend to find out more about what we do. More information can be found at theblae.org or on our facebook page and village noticeboards. We represent our community as you need us to as well as being custodians of the village hall - Committee members can often be found at the community café if you want to have a chat about anything.
