BROADBAND

"We Are Enabled"

For all you "surfers" un the village, and the more avid ones will know this already, BROADBAND did arrive in St Cyrus on the 4th August, well, nearly! After some initial teething troubles with the village Telephone Exchange, we actually went live around 21st August. For those who did sign up with their ISP, the transition from the old analogue 56kb speed to anything up to 2Mb has been relatively seamless. Needless to say those on Broadband are very pleased at the increase in speed for searching the net or sending/receiving e-mail

BT are in consultation with most ISP's relating to ongoing work at our local Exchange and it is envisaged work will be complete by the end of September. There may be some disruption in service but it is hoped any switching will be carried out early a.m.

For those not yet able to receive Broadband there is some hope. BT are stating that after trials in Milton Keynes (mentioned in last newsletter) it will be able to offer Broadband approximately 3km further from the exchange - taking the distance to about 8km Additionally, from September 6th, BT have changed the way they calculate if a line can support Broadband (ADSL) or not. For the 512kb service"Every" line will be accepted (which was not previously the case) and tested regardless of distance from the exchange. If anyone not currently able to receive Broadband is unsure, contact your ISP or go to BT website (WWW.bt.com).

St Cyrus. Recreation Association

Established in Spring 2004 as a constituted body with a remit to improve and develop the provision for recreational facilities within our area. The main focus of this remit is the Public Park on Ecclesgreig Road.

To date the S.C.R.A. has -

Put in place a onstitution Reviewed possible fund-raising ventures at a local level. Investigated potential sources of lottery funding. Opened dialogue with Aberdeenshire Council. Put draft proposals and questions out to local people with regard s to "Knowing what the St Cyrus Village would like to have at the Public Park."

The following letter to the Hall Committee has recently been received from the <u>Inverbervie</u> <u>Medical Practice</u>:

I refer to your letter dated 26th July 2004 and would like to inform the committee that the GP's will only be able to provide a surgery in St Cyrus once a month. This is due to the number of GP's that the surgery now has. The practice has not been in a position to recruit a replacement for Dr Wilson.

The Practice is looking at all options at present and maybe in the future will run murse led clinics at St Cyrus. We will still be running flu clinics in October and November in the Hall.

Salmon Fishing at St Cyrus

Salmon fishing on the coast between Dundee and Aberdeen has been carried out for centuries, and few places have been more closely associated with this than St Cyrus. References to salmon at St. Cyrus date back to 13th Century charters. Six hundred years ago. a Scottish King landed at Inverbervie and on reaching the shore, was offered salmon. According to legend, the King ordered 3 fish to be gutted, and then asked the presenter his name. As he had no name other than a Christian name, the courtiers laughingly declared that his name should be "Gut three". Thus the local name of Guthrie was born.

In 1938, salmon fishing was the second industry in St Cyrus, agriculture being the largest. These 2 industries still employ about 30% of the total available workforce but are now heavily outnumbered by industrial workers commuting to Montrose. Probably the last 40 years have seen a greater change to the area than the last 400.

Who can foretell what the next 40 years will bring?

The clock in St Cyrus Church was presented to the parish in 1848 and the brass plate show above is attached to the frame of the clock But how does this date fit in with the date over the Church door which is 1854. Although not checked against any church records, it is understood considerable alterations were required when Miss Watson presented the clock. I think it is likely that the original entrance to the church was through the bell tower, since at that time there was no organ. The main door was moved to the other end. The date above the door refers to the date of the alterations.

The clock was built by Brysons of Edinburgh in 1848. It has a "deadbeat" escapement and goes for eight days when fully wound The mechanism is driven by weights on a wire rope, which fall the whole height of the tower. The pendulum is 7ft long. Originally the clock had three trains:- one to control the movement of the hands. one to strike the hours and one to strike the quarters. The one for the quarters has been out of use for as long as I know (35yrs) and the two bells were removed before I came. It is probable that they were removed after the war. The hour bell has a rope and can also be used for church services.

Throughout the war, the clock was probably stopped and the chimes were certainly not used. This was because church bells were to be rung in the event of the Germans invading. After the war a collection was held in the village to restore the clock. This led some people to believe that the clock belonged to the village and not the Church. When Miss Watson presented the clock to the Parish, as far as she was concerened, the Parish was the Church.

The clock has to be wound once a week, usually on a Sunday, and this means climbing to the top of the tower, and the handle is about 18 inches long, so it is a 3ft circle. Generally speaking the clock keeps quite good time, though now and again for no very good reason it will suddenly go fast or slow. The timing is controlled by the length of the pendulum: to make it go faster you shorten it ,and lengthen it to slow it down. The clock receives an annual service. It is important not to over oil it as this attracts grit, which causes wear. It would be nice to install an automatic winding device, but the clock has gone for 150 years. The meachanism might keep going for another 100 years. By the same token some vital part may break tomorrow and if it did, a new bit would almost certainly have to be specially made. It may be that in the near future the clock will have to be eletrified. There is a group in the village who hope to raise money to repaint the clock faces, and the Church would be very pleased to accept their offer. though as yet no estimates have been taken

The Church tower has been a landmark for at least 150 years and although we are no longer dependant on the clock to set our watches, it would be nice to keep it going for another century and a half, even if the mechanism is not original. But it will cost money
